In memoriam — Dr. Stephen Clark

It is with a profound sadness that we share the news of the passing of Dr. Stephen Clark on March 28th, 2025.

Dr. Clark was not only a valued member of the Faculty of Agriculture team but also a kind and hardworking individual who will be greatly missed by all of us. Dr. Clark started with the Nova Scotia Agricultural College (NSAC) in September 1992 as Professor of Economics and member of the Business and Social Science Department. Dr. Clark earned his Bachelor of Arts at Guelph, an MSc at the University of Saskatchewan and his PhD at North Carolina State University.

During his time here, he made significant contributions to the field of agricultural production econometrics and became an expert in time series analysis applied to agriculture along with the quantification of climate change related to agriculture.

Our thoughts and condolences go out to Dr. Clark's family and loved ones during this incredibly difficult time. There is no memorial planned at this time. Flags will be lowered to half mast today in honour of his memory.
